

WSU ON-CAMPUS ARCHAEOLOGICAL FIELD SCHOOL June 10-July 5 and/or July 8-August 2, 1985

Washington State University is offering an on-campus field school to archaeologically explore its first 100 years. W.S.U. Centennial 'digs' focus on four areas of campus, providing a contrast between the earliest structures: Stevens Hall (1895; women's residence hall), Stimson Hall (1923; men's residence hall), Thompson Hall (1893; administrative, bookstore, library and classrooms), and the Animal Science Barn (1922; agriculture, husbandry and vet science activities). Archaeological excavations around these structures, oral histories, university histories, and pictorials provide a unique means to investigate up to 100 years of university life.

Field training emphasizes the fundamentals of field archaeology, including experiences in conventional excavation techniques, documentation, and preservation of artifacts. As an on-campus program, facilities and campus faculty and research staff provide opportunities for lab tours and lectures concerning archival research, historical archaeology, archaeological use of computers, data management, methods of environmental analyses, radio carbon dating and public archaeology. Field trips to archaeological sites in the area will take place.

Housing and food services can be obtained on W.S.U.'s campus (approximately \$329.00 for four weeks). Tuition for one of the two four week sessions is \$260.00 (4 credit hours) or \$520.00 (8 credit hours) for the full eight weeks.* (The eight week program provides a comprehensive experience in field techniques). Tuition for the sessions is open to all undergraduates, regardless of major. Application forms must include a statement of interest, a statement of health and two letters of recommendation. Application deadline is May 20, 1985; selection will be made by May 25, 1985.
