Don Carlos Hempstead

Don Carlos Hempstead was a First Lieutenant in the United States Marine Corps Reserve who also went to Washington State University. He was born on August 23rd, 1920, his parents are Don Carlos Hempstead (Father) and Jessie C. Hempstead (Mother). Don's father worked at the international revenue office in Spokane WA. Don also had two siblings, Guss S. Hempstead (Brother) and a younger sister Marygale Hempstead, they lived together in Spokane Washington up until 1938 when he graduated high school. Don Went to Lewis and Clark high school in Spokane WA, and their school has made a plaque to honor veterans that served in World War 2. On this plaque Don's name is engraved and displayed in the school along with other members who went to that school and served in the military as well. After high school Don went to a recruiter and asked the Marine Corps if he could join and ended up joining the Marine Corps reserve. Don took the officer route for the military where he will do college to get an education while in the reserves and then start his military training after completion of school. In 1940 he started his college education at Washington State University in Pullman WA, there he was studying Electrical Engineering. While attending WSU Mr. Hempstead lived at Stimson Hall on campus and joined they Montezuma club. While in this club Don played baseball and made it into the evergreen paper when his team played against Tau Kappa Epsilon on May 9th, 1941, to which they lost by 1 point. The game was apparently very exciting since the beginning in that it was a neck and neck game where Hempstead took the lead (gaining attention on the evergreen) but lost in the end by 1 point. In 1941 Don Hempstead got his orders to serve his country to help the war in the pacific, he was assigned to 1stBn, 22ndMarReinf, 5th AC, FMF (see abbreviations

below). The 1stbn 22nd marines is a very old infantry unit in the marine corps that was first activated in the 1860's and still a part of the military today. Don was assigned to this unit which saw most of its combat in various battles in Germany, but also supported other marine forces in the pacific as a reinforcement unit to help the battles while pushing up the islands towards Japan. Don Hempstead was a platoon leader in company C and they participated in various island landings and engagements, some of these were Engebi, Perry Islands, Eniwok Atoll, and Marshall Islands in February 18-19 and February 22, 1944. During these landings Don was recommended to be awarded the Navy Cross for exemplary leadership and sacrifice for his platoon and his country. Unfortunately, 1stLT Hempstead was grievously injured on Engebi and Perry islands after leading his platoon and fighting off many Japanese soldiers. These wounds were too severe to heal from and he later died on Marshall Island. July 26, 1944. For his outstanding heroism and performance in duty he was later awarded the navy cross for his actions. Don Hempstead is currently buried at The Golden Gate National Cemetery and is honored at the National WW2 Memorial in Washington D.C. for his service to his country.

Navy Cross Citation: The President of the United States of America takes pleasure in presenting the Navy Cross to Second Lieutenant Don C. Hempstead, Jr. (MCSN: 0-19640), United States Marine Corps Reserve, for extraordinary heroism as a Platoon Leader of Company C, First Battalion, Twenty-Second Marines (Reinforced), First Provisional Marine Brigade, Fifth Amphibious Corps, during action against enemy Japanese forces on Engebi and Parry Islands, Eniwetok Atoll, Marshals Group, on 18, 19 and 22 February 1944. Dauntlessly leading his platoon in hand-to-hand combat immediately upon landing, First Lieutenant Hempstead pressed home the attack and, striking fiercely on both islands, neutralized the immediate opposition. When his platoon suffered heavy casualties in the assault on Parry island, he refused evacuation

for his own wound and, determined to crush all resistance, continually exposed himself to enemy fire to lead his men in the offensive throughout the day. Quick to observe a fellow officer wounded and under attack, First Lieutenant Hempstead unhesitatingly went to his aid and, personally killing four of the Japanese and driving numerous others to flight with grenades and carbine fire, saved the life of his comrade. By his initiative, courage, forceful leadership and unwavering devotion to duty, he served as an inspiration to his men, and his gallant conduct throughout upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service.

1. It is recommended that the Navy Cross be awarded to Second Lieutenant Don C. Hempstead, Jr. U. S. Marine Corps Reserve.

2. Second Lt. Hempstead participated in the landing attack on Engebi and Parry Islands, Eniwetok Atoll, Marshall Islands, on February 18-19 and February 22, 1944. Hempstead landed in command of a rifle platoon on Engebi Island and was immediately engaged in hand to hand combat on the beach. With complete disregard for his own safety, he himself killed many Japanese in leading his platoon in the attack and by his valiant and outstanding leadership was a constant inspiration to his men. This action by Hempstead's platoon was a vital factor in securing the left flank of the battalion and contributed greatly to the Landing Team's success on Engebi.

Upon landing in the assault wave on Parry Island, Hempstead's platoon was immediately engaged in heavy hand to hand combat by a numerically superior enemy force. Although he had suffered a foot fracture in the landing, Second Lt. Hempstead, disregarding his painful and disabling injury, lead his platoon against the enemy, himself killing many, and by his courageous and daring leadership, so inspired his men that they completely annihilated the enemy force engaging them. Seeing that all but two of the non-commissioned officers in his platoon were either killed or seriously wounded, he refused to be evacuated and continued to lead the platoon in the assault throughout the entire day. During the subsequent action, his platoon was exposed to five inch gunfire, mortar and machine gun fire, which caused many casualties. He promptly withdrew his platoon from the immediate area to reorganize and continue the attack in the face of heavy machine gun and mortar fire.

During this attack, seeing First Lt. Swanson, who was lying wounded, attacked by several enemy, Hempstead personally killed at least four of them by grenade and carbine fire, driving the remainder to flight and saving First Lt. Swanson's life. By the end of the day, his injury produced complete disability and he was evacuated in spite of his protests. His utter disregard for his own safety while leading his platoon into hand to hand combat with the enemy and his daring and outstanding courage in the subsequent assaults

CITATION:

*For extraordinary heroism as a platoon leader during action against enemy forces on Engebi and Paryy Islands 18-19 February and 22 February, 1944. Leading his platoon in the front lines in both attacks, he displayed outstanding courage, leadership and utter disregard for his own safety. On both Engebi and Parry Islands he led his platoon in hand to hand combat as soon as they had landed on the beach, in both cases annihilating the enemy opposing them. During the assault on Parry Island, his platoon suffered heavy casualties, including all but two of the non-commissioned officers, and although himself a walking wounded, he refused to be evacuated and continued to lead his platoon in the assault throughout the entire day.

During the subsequent action he continually exposed himself to enemy fire without regard for his own safety and saved the life of a fellow officer who was wounded and being attacked by personally killing four of the enemy and driving numerous others to flight with grenades and carbine fire. His outstanding courage and inspiring leadership were in keeping with the highest traditions of the naval service."
